- 1969 <u>Black Panther Party</u> members <u>Bunchy Carter</u> and <u>John Huggins</u> are killed during a meeting in Campbell Hall on the campus of <u>UCLA</u>.
- <u>1977</u> Convicted murderer <u>Gary Gilmore</u> is executed by a <u>firing squad</u> in <u>Utah</u>, ending a ten-year moratorium on <u>capital punishment</u> in the United States.
- 1981 President of the Philippines Ferdinand Marcos lifts martial law eight years and five months after declaring it.
- 1982 "Cold Sunday": in numerous cities in the United States temperatures fall to their lowest levels in over 100 years.
- 1983 The tallest department store in the world, <u>Hudson's</u> flagship store in downtown <u>Detroit</u>, closes due to high cost of operating.
- 1989 <u>Cleveland School massacre</u>: Patrick Purdy opens fire with an <u>assault rifle</u> at the Cleveland Elementary School playground in <u>Stockton, California</u>, killing five children and wounding 29 others and one teacher before taking his own life.
- <u>1991</u> <u>Gulf War</u>: <u>Operation Desert Storm</u> begins early in the morning. <u>Iraq</u> fires 8 <u>Scud</u> missiles into <u>Israel</u> in an unsuccessful bid to provoke Israeli retaliation.
- 1991 Harald V becomes King of Norway on the death of his father, Olav V.
- 1992 During a visit to South Korea, <u>Japanese Prime Minister Kiichi Miyazawa</u> apologizes for forcing Korean women into <u>sexual slavery</u> during <u>World War II</u>.

- 1994 1994 Northridge earthquake: A magnitude 6.7 earthquake hits Northridge, California.
- <u>1995</u> The <u>Great Hanshin earthquake</u>: A magnitude 7.3 <u>earthquake</u> occurs near <u>Kobe, Japan</u>, causing extensive property damage and killing 6,434 people.
