Democratic staffers of the Senate Intelligence Committee obtained classified documents at the center of a bitter struggle with the CIA some three years before the agency determined that the materials had been spirited out of a secret facility and demanded their return, according to U.S. officials.

Plotting a U.S. response to Vladimir Putin's land grab in Ukraine requires an understanding that the Russian leader operates without a clear-cut foreign policy and out of "dual impulses" of asserting Moscow's power while courting Western approval, according to an American diplomat who observed him up close for five years.

- <u>1804</u> <u>Louisiana Purchase</u>: In <u>St. Louis, Missouri</u>, a formal ceremony is conducted to transfer ownership of the <u>Louisiana Territory</u> from France to the United States.

- 1. <u>Pentagon outlines ideas for hybrid retirement system</u>. Amid attempts to reduce military personnel spending, the Pentagon on Thursday presented its official thinking on the politically touchy issue of how remake the military retirement system.
- 2. <u>Commissaries to be run as a business, not a benefit</u>. Behind the plan to slash taxpayer support of commissaries is a concept Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel and his senior advisors have embraced that base grocery stores should operate as a business and not a benefit.
